

Census of ACT public schools August 2022

This publication provides information on students enrolled in Canberra public schools at 5 August 2022

Release date: 10 October 2022

Executive Summary

This publication presents the results from the Canberra public school census conducted on Friday 5 August 2022.

Student enrolments by level of schooling




Figure 1: Enrolments by level of schooling, 2018 to 2022

At August 2022 census, there were 50,615 students enrolled in Canberra public schools. This represented a decrease of 317 enrolments (-0.6%) since August 2021 (Table 1 and Figure 1). From August 2018 to August 2022, enrolments increased by 2,656 students (5.5%).

Annual enrolment increases in ACT schools were consistently over two percent from 2018-2020, however since then growth has slowed, particularly in the last 12 months when it was negative for the first time in over a decade. This is partly explained by a change in the annual rate of growth in the estimated resident population (ERP) for school aged children, from around two percent in previous years to less than one percent between June 2020 and June 2021 (Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), 2022).

The most noticeable change in enrolment growth was in preschool, where enrolments across the Territory fell by 397 students (-8.4%) since August 2021. Public preschool enrolments increased by 86 students (2.0%) from the February 2022 census indicating the fall in enrolments occurred between August 2021 and February 2022. Reduced enrolments in non-compulsory preschool in 2022 was most likely due to a combination of factors including a reduction in the ERP for preschool aged children (ABS, 2022) and some families choosing not to enrol their children in preschool, due to concerns about the spread of COVID-19 in the community.

There were:

- 31,623 students enrolled in public primary schools. This represents a decrease of 626 enrolments (-1.9%) since August 2021.
 - o preschool enrolments decreased by 397 students (-8.4%) to 4,311 students
 - o kindergarten to year 6 enrolments decreased by 229 students (-0.8%) to 27,312 students.
- 12,641 students enrolled in public high schools, an increase of 333 enrolments (2.7%) from August 2021 to August 2022.
- 6,351 students enrolled in public colleges, a decrease of 24 enrolments (-0.4%) from August 2021 to August 2022.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students

At August 2022 census, there were 2,121 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and young people enrolled in ACT public schools (Table 2 and Table 5), representing 4.2 percent of total enrolments. This was a decrease of 83 enrolments (-3.8%) since August 2021, with preschool enrolments dropping by 63 and college enrolment dropping by 28 in that period.

Enrolments of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students increased by 209 students (10.9%) since August 2018. Ninety-three students were enrolled in Koori preschool programs; with 46 children taking up the option to attend both Koori and universal preschool programs.

Students enrolled in disability education programs

At August 2022 census, there were 2,909 students (Table 3), representing 5.7 percent of all enrolments, accessing disability education programs at either mainstream or specialist public schools. This was an increase of 30 students (1.0%) since August 2021 and an increase of 513 enrolments (21.4%) since August 2018.

Student enrolments by gender and year level

There were proportionally more male (51.8%) than female (47.8%) students (Table 4). This general trend was consistent across all academic year levels, with the greatest proportional difference being at the high school level where 53.1 percent were males and 46.0 percent were females.

Non-school education

It is recognised that there are alternative educational pathways for students to undertake school level courses other than by attending an ACT public or non-government school. At August 2022, 445 children and young people were home educated in the ACT, an increase of 35 students (8.5%) since August 2021. A further 142 students who were of school age undertook school equivalent courses at the Canberra Institute of Technology, a decrease of 30 students (-0.2%) since August 2021.

In addition, there were 28 ACT students enrolled in the NSW Finigan School of Distance Education.

Student enrolments by network, school and year level

The North/Gungahlin network (31.3%) had the highest proportion of primary school enrolments followed by South/Weston (26.2%), Belconnen (25.4%), and Tuggeranong (17.2%).

Students to teacher ratio

The students to teacher ratio takes account of all teaching resources allocated to support students. Students to teacher ratios are calculated by dividing the total Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) students by the FTE teaching staff. Overall, the students to teacher ratio for the ACT public school system was 13.2.

Explanatory Notes

Reference date

The 2022 August census was conducted on Friday 5 August 2022.

Scope and coverage

The August census included all Canberra public schools providing primary, secondary and specialist education. Jervis Bay School was included in Canberra public primary schools as the ACT Education Directorate administers the Jervis Bay School for the Australian Government under a service agreement.

Collection

Canberra public school census data was electronically downloaded from the Directorate's centralised administrative systems.

Student enrolments

The census included students who were officially enrolled in a school on census day and who were active in a primary, secondary or specialist education program at that school. Students who were unexplainably absent for more than four continuous school weeks prior to census date were included if the principal received written documentation signed by the guardian indicating that the student was to return to school on or before 12 August 2022.

Preschool

The Census included three, four, and five-year-old pre-school students who were enrolled in a school prior to starting kindergarten. Preschool level data also included students who were attending a preschool program as an early entry student. Please note, children can be enrolled in more than one preschool program and may attend preschool for more than one year.

Primary school level

The primary school level of schooling included students from preschool to year 6, unless 'K-6' was specified.

High school level

The high school level of schooling is equivalent to the lower secondary level of education of the Australian Standard Classification of Education and includes students in years 7, 8, 9 and 10. A small number of year 10 students undertake early access programs at Canberra college.

College level

The college level of schooling is equivalent to the senor secondary level of education of the Australian Standard Classification of Education and includes students in years 11 and 12 as well as those

students defined as older. A small number of year 10 students undertake early access programs at an ACT college.

Older students (O)

Students in public schools aged 18 years by 31 December in the year prior to the commencement of their college studies, were classified as Older (O).

Flexible education

The census included students who were participating in Flexible Education. Flexible Education provides alternative education options across five campuses. These campuses include the Muliyan Program, the Cottage, Hospital School, Murrumbidgee School and Distance Education. Students attending Flexible Education sites were counted in the census at their mainstream school, except for the number of students who were enrolled in the NSW Finigan School of Distance Education which is listed separately in the Non-school education section on page 3.

Introductory English Centres

Introductory English Centres (IECs) are for students who require intensive full-time English language instruction. There were four IECs in the primary sector, conducted at Charnwood-Dunlop School (Belconnen Primary IEC), North Ainslie Primary School (Northside IEC), Throsby School (Gungahlin Primary IEC) and Hughes Primary School (Southside IEC). There was one IEC in the secondary sector, conducted at Dickson College (Secondary IEC).

Students enrolled in disability education programs

The Census included students who met the ACT Student Disability Criteria. These students accessed disability education programs at either mainstream or specialist public schools.

There are four specialist schools in Canberra; Black Mountain School, Cranleigh School, Malkara School, and The Woden School. Specialist schools cater for students with a moderate to profound intellectual disability, severe Autism Spectrum Disorder or with multiple disabilities that require intensive levels of support.
