





The ACT Government announced in the 2018/19 budget that it will invest \$18.819 million for the modernisation of Campbell Primary School. This will comprise new learning spaces to accommodate 450 Kindergarten to Year -6 students landscaping and ancillary works.

Delays to construction at Campbell Primary School can be attributed to the global COVID-19 pandemic associated labour and supply chain complications as well as significant periods of rain in Canberra. These factors are beyond the control of the Education Directorate.

Demolition works on site have been completed within the contract timeframe. Due to one of the building wings containing hazardous material the site was decanted in line with Education Directorate policies

There are no students at Campbell Primary School currently using a library as their classroom. The Campbell Primary School library has been moved into the former staff room as part of the planned modernisation of the school. The building that used to be the library has been converted into learning spaces dedicated to the four classes of years 5 and 6 at the school. In addition to the former library space these classes are accessing a court yard and another classroom. The modernisation of Campbell Primary includes building learning communities — these year 5 and 6 students have been established in their learning community this year. When the four classes of this learning community are all working collaboratively they can come together in the larger space within the former library.

There is sufficient capacity within Campbell Primary School to cater to the number of students enrolled. As such there was no need to install any additional transportable classrooms

Lunch breaks have been temporarily staggered at Campbell Primary School during the construction period. Students in K-2 and 3-6 groupings have separate half hour play breaks. These play breaks are preceded by a period of time to eat lunch.

Both the building and landscaping work on the Campbell Primary School modernisation project is expected to be complete by April 2022.

The construction of a brand new school on a greenfield site is not financially comparable to a renovation and modernisation project on an existing one. At Campbell there is no requirement to build a new Administration building Library Hall or Preschool carparks or other site infrastructure or services. The funding announced by the ACT Government in the 2018/19 Budget is sufficient to complete the scope of the project. \$940 000 has been committed from the construction budget for landscaping excluding hardscape and Disability Discrimination Act (DAA) compliance.

Background

Temporary accommodation was required at Campbell Primary School to facilitate the demolition of Building B due to the presence of friable asbestos within the building cavity. Five new double transportable buildings and one new transportable amenities block have been provided at Campbell Primary School including covered decks and access paths.

Approval has previously been granted for the engagement of Manteena Pty. Ltd. through a Project Management Agreement (PMA) contract for the provision of transportable classrooms and the associated site works. The current approved value of this engagement is \$3,587, 661 (incl. GST).

Issues

The project has been sufficiently completed to allow occupation by the school on Day 1, Term 1 2018. However, Manteena have advised through Infrastructure Finance and Capital Works, that the current financial approval is not sufficient to complete and finalise the project. The following issues have contributed to the overall cost increases:

- The extremely tight timeframes to achieve day 1 2018 completion has had a negative impact on Manteena's ability to obtain full tender panels. This has resulted in market prices that were not as competitive as originally estimated particularly with the roofing, painting, metalwork and carpentry trade packages.
- Inclement weather during the building delivery phase required the construction of temporary roads and access ways to facilitate transportable building relocations.
- Funding for the demolition of building B at was not included within this current package of works. However, it has been necessary to include some of the scope such as new main switchboard and major services relocations so that the demolition program could be maintained. Note: this will only increase the value of this procurement, the funding for this work has been included within the total project funding.
- An additional payment to Fleetwood was required to replace transportable buildings taken from other jurisdictions.
- A number of additional works have been agreed with each school i.e. blinds to windows, covered ways, additional fencing and landscaping.

The approved contract amount did include a small contingency amount that has been exhausted throughout the initial tendering period.

Consultation with Strategic Finance and Funding Implications

Strategic Finance have reviewed and endorsed this brief.

The total project value will remain within the total available funding allocation and no additional funds are required.

Background

Campbell Primary School is one of the Directorate's older school facilities and has had several refurbishments and new building works undertaken since it was opened. The Education Directorate has recently demolished Building B at the back of the school as it contained friable crocidolite asbestos within the wall cavities that could not be managed over the long term.

Master planning and feasibility study works have commenced with the Education Directorate, Campbell Primary School Staff, Infrastructure Finance and Capital Works, and external consultants. As part of the Master Planning and feasibility works external consultants will also under take due diligence investigations of the existing facility. These investigations will inform the master planning for the modernisation of the existing school facility.

The 2018-19 ACT Budget provided \$18.819 million for the Campbell Primary School Modernisation project.

Issues

As the school is over 50 years old the existing infrastructure could constrain options for the modernisation of current spaces. Due diligence works during the master planning and feasibility study phase will assist the future design works for the modernisation of the existing school.

To maintain the current program and achieve the completion dates for both the new build ready for the 2021 school year and refurbishment works to be undertaken during the 2021 school year respectively, we require to undertake the early builder procurement process in parallel with the master planning and feasibility study phase. This also allows greater opportunity and program float to undertake stakeholder engagement through the design process.

Campbell Primary School

The Education Directorate invited input from community members and other stakeholders of Campbell Primary School to be involved in the design of the future learning spaces at the school.

The purpose of the community engagement was to:

- obtain feedback from the community to inform the future learning spaces including: the buildings and landscape, play and social areas, community connection and accessibility
- provide the community with the opportunity to help shape the school, so that it best meets community expectations and needs

Engagement with the school community occurred across June to August 2018 across a range of mediums to identify the priorities of the school community.

This information was collated in a report (with a detailed list of priorities) to assist with the development of the master plan design for Campbell Primary School.

A summary of the engagement process and the priorities identified by the school community was shared with them in November 2018 by the principal. The community engagement program also captured a range of operational issues raised by the community such as active transport, bag storage, flag poles and recycling bins. These have been shared with the Principal to manage.

A copy of this report is attached at Appendix A.

Next steps:

The master concept plan for the school is in its final stages of development and once finalised, ICW and the principal will brief the School Board and P&C. These plans will also be shared with the Campbell Primary School community allowing them to provide further comment/feedback.

A detailed action plan is being developed with the principal to identify the best way forward to continue the engagement and obtain input on the detailed design.

Campbell Primary School Modernisation Community Engagement Outcomes

The Education Directorate invited input from community members and other stakeholders of Campbell Primary School to be involved in the design of the future learning spaces at the school.

The purpose of the community engagement was to:

- obtain feedback from the community to inform the design of the future learning spaces including: the buildings and landscape, play and social areas, community connection and accessibility
- provide the community with the opportunity to help shape the school, so that it best meets community expectations and needs

The engagement activity occurred throughout Terms 2 and 3 in 2018, capturing input/feedback through:

- 57 voices video recording of current students in years 2-6
- community workshops
- focus groups
- an online survey

The Process

Workshops – June 2018

Three community workshops were held on Wednesday 6 June (2x parents/neighbours and 1x for staff) with total participation of 54 people. Methods were used to effectively and efficiently capture and theme the feedback and ideas of participants around the future learning spaces at the school.

The workshops provided an overview of the future direction of pedagogy and education in the ACT and included two short videos on modern learning environments.

Feedback and suggestions provided in a Term 1 information session were revisited. The school's vision, purpose, values and behaviour, graduate profile and priorities (critical success factors) will also inform the process. These were developed, and are highly valued, by the community.

The engagement aimed to capture views/feedback using the following principles as a framework: Learners and learning, Community, Wellbeing, Sustainability, Technology and Diversity.

When leaving the workshops, participants were asked to comment on the level of engagement and enjoyment they experienced. Results indicate a good level of satisfaction and engagement with the workshops.

57 students (one for each year the school has been opened) from across the school (year 2- 6) were filmed and asked:

What do they like about their school?

Where do they learn best?
What would they like their school to look like in the future?

Many comments/ideas were generated by staff, parents and neighbours at the June workshop (over 650 ideas) in addition to the ideas captured from the 57 students. Their ideas are captured in Appendix A - June Workshop and 57 Voices.


Many of the ideas generated during the June workshop were 'givens' in terms of the building design and are covered within the sustainability brief. The remaining ideas were used in the online survey under following themes:

- Learning spaces
- Technology
- Social, play and outdoor areas
- Access to the school
- Arrival at school
- Out of hours school care
- Connecting with the community
- Sustainability
- Staff facilities
- Design and Build

Online Survey

The online survey was used to ask parents, staff, neighbours and senior students (Years 5 & 6) to prioritise the many ideas/suggestions identified in the first workshop. The top priorities (as voted by the community) were the focus of further discussion and clarification during the second series of focus groups held on 15 August 2018.

131 responses were received for the survey. 30% parents, 41% students, 25% staff, 4% community members. A copy of the survey results and prioritization is available in Attachment B – Survey Results.



Workshops - August 2018

The second series of community workshops was held on 15 August 2018 (2 x parents/neighbours and 1 x for staff) with a total of 34 people participating. They were asked to define the purpose of the design priority and identify the vision of excellence or design for the

priorities which had been identified through the online survey. Their feedback is provided in Attachment C – Outcomes from 15 August workshops.

Next steps

The information collected throughout the engagement process will also be shared with the school community, to demonstrate the volume of ideas received and how that information will be used to inform the design of the new spaces.

There is further opportunity to engage the school community once the building design concepts/master plan is developed and an updated communication/engagement plan can be provided.

The community engagement program has also captured a range of operational issues raised by the community such as active transport, bag storage and recycling bins and these will be shared with the Principal to manage.

Background

The ACT Government announced in the 2018-19 budget that it will invest \$18.819 million for the modernisation of Campbell Primary School. This will comprise new learning spaces to accommodate 450 Kindergarten to Year 6 (K-6) students, an upgrade of existing buildings, landscaping and ancillary works. The project will include the construction of contemporary teaching and learning spaces utilising the footprint of the recently demolished building. The project will incorporate disability access modifications as well as bringing the remaining school facilities up to current building code requirements.

The modernisation of Campbell Primary School strengthens the ACT Government's commitment to improve school facilities and build state-of-the-art, sustainable educational facilities.

The Education Directorate (EDU), Infrastructure and Capital Works (ICW) in conjunction with Infrastructure, Finance and Capital Works (IFCW) has finalised the masterplan process and site due diligence investigation works for the modernisation of Campbell Primary School.

Issues

ICW, in conjunction with IFCW, have developed six masterplan options for the modernisation of Campbell Primary School. The options are labelled A to F (<u>Attachment A</u>). The six options were developed to incorporate the specifications detailed in the Sustainable Deliverables Brief and the ideas collected during the initial community engagement process with the school's community.

Options A and B align closely with the approved Business Case in that the existing Junior Wing is retained and refurbished, with a separate new building to replace the one that was demolished.

Options C, D, E and F all propose the demolition of the Junior Wing which allows for the construction of new contemporary teaching and learning spaces for all students, a STEM learning space, amenities and associated works.

A quantity surveyor (cost estimator) was engaged to provide a cost analysis of the six options. Initial cost estimates for all options were below the original forecast budget of \$18.819 million. The quantity surveyor indicates Options A and B are the least expensive, followed by D, E, C and F respectively. There is \$1.2 million difference between the least expensive option and the most expensive option, with a total of \$500k difference between options D, E, C and F.

<u>Preferred Masterplan – Option F</u>

Option F is the preferred masterplan after being reviewed by the Campbell Primary School principal, ICW and IFCW. This option includes new contemporary teaching and learning spaces for 450 K-6 students over two levels and includes a centrally located STEM teaching area. Lift access will be provided between the ground and first floor. The canteen has been relocated from the Hall to a central location between the administration area and ground

floor learning communities, providing ease of access for all students and allowing for direct access to the playground.

The preferred Option F allows for a staged construction phase which will provide minimal disruption to the school and community. The first stage of construction would be the new learning communities and associated landscaping works. Once completed students can be decanted from the Junior Wing and existing transportable units and relocate to the new building. The second stage of the construction would be the removal of the existing Junior Wing and transportable units and landscape and remedial site works occurring thereafter.

Option F is assessed to be lower risk than the other options utilising new construction and major refurbishment works. Option F constrains the construction activities and minimises disruption to the school's education delivery continuity. All options were considered in relation to the lessons learnt from the recently completed Belconnen High School modernisation project.

Remaining Masterplan Options

- Options A and B:
 - Both options address the original brief of the Business Case;
 - Due diligence investigations report that there is major refurbishment works required in the Junior Wing including existing services which are required to bring the building up to current building standards;
 - There is an operational need to ensure that the Junior Wing is renovated to a suitable standard to ensure equitable facilities between the new building and refurbished building;
 - There is a significant risk that when works commence, additional issues may arise. Options A and B have a higher level of risk associated due to latent conditions; and
 - Rated as a medium risk.

Option C:

- Allows for a completely new build of all the Learning Communities ensuring equitable facilities are provided across the school;
- Staging of construction and the relocation of students and staff is problematic due to the Junior Wing being demolished and two of the new buildings being constructed on its footprint. This option will be most disruptive to the school;
- Most of the construction is centrally located on the school campus. Staff, student and community movement as well as construction access would be problematic. Supervision of students in play areas would be difficult due to construction access;
- This option would more than likely require additional Transportable Learning Units on site or repurpose the hall as classrooms during construction.
- Rated as a medium/high risk.

Option D:

Option D allows for one new Learning Community building accommodating 450 students. The building would generally be at the one level and provides equitable facilities across the school. Having one larger learning community encroaches on landscaping and external play space;

- This option includes the demolition of the current Junior Wing and allows for a staged construction which will provide minimal disruption to the school and community. The first stage of construction would be the new learning communities and associated landscaping works. Once complete, students from the Junior Wing and transportable units could move into the new building. The second stage of the construction would be the removal of the existing Junior Wing and transportable units and landscape and remedial site works occurring thereafter; and
- o The STEM and Canteen are in a separate building which will be partially located on the footprint of the demolished Junior Wing. The proposed Canteen location limits access and use due to the location.
- o Rated as a low/medium risk.

Option E:

- Option E allows for two new Learning Community building accommodating 450 students, most of the Learning Communities would be on one level with a section being on a higher level. Providing new Learning Communities provides equitable facilities across the school. There is a disconnect between the larger Learning Community building and the second Learning Community which may limit the collaborative design of the teaching spaces as well as the functionality;
- This option includes the demolition of the current Junior Wing and allows for a staged construction phase which will provide minimal disruption to the school and community. The first stage of construction would be the new learning communities and associated landscaping works. Once complete, students from the Junior Wing and transportable units could move into the new building. The second stage of the construction would be the removal of the existing Junior Wing and transportable units and landscape and remedial site works occurring thereafter; and
- The STEM and Canteen facility are in a separate building which will be partially located on the footprint of the demolished Junior Wing. The proposed Canteen location limits access and use due to the location.
- Rated as a low/medium risk.

Consultation with Strategic Finance and Funding Implication

Strategic Finance have confirmed that funding as per the Business Case has been approved by Treasury in the 2018-19 Budget.

Consultations

EDU invited input from community members and other stakeholders of Campbell Primary School to be involved in the design for the future learning spaces at the school.

The purpose of the community engagement was to:

- obtain feedback from the community to inform the future learning spaces including the buildings and landscape, play and social areas, community connection and accessibility; and
- provide the community with the opportunity to help shape the school, so that it best meets community expectations and needs.




ICW, IFCW, Strategic Finance and external consultants have been involved in the consultation process for masterplan phase of the modernisation works.



additional funding of \$1.42m excluding GST through appropriation of *Better schools for our kids* — and *Campbell Primary School*. The briefed works include the construction of three new learning communities for 450 students, canteen, STEM Area (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics), Small Group Program facilities and landscaping.

2. <u>Attachment 1</u> – Phase 2 Recommendation: seeks delegate approval to move from Phase 1 to Phase 2 of the contract. The recommendation and its attachments outline the work progressed through Phase 1.

Issues

- 3. As a result of post tender updates to the Education Directorates Infrastructure Specification (EDIS), Infrastructure and Capital Works (ICW), Campbell Primary School and Infrastructure Delivery partners (IDP) have conducted detailed review of the design submission by the contractor and identified areas requiring realignment with the latest functional briefs. All additional items and design change details have been captured in Project Scope Change register.
- 4. The additional changes include airlocks to the learning communities, internal queueing areas to the canteen, additional storage rooms, tea points within the staff rooms and additional photovoltaic panels. Other changes identified are latent conditions including hazardous material removal, demolition of the temporary amenities block and tipping fees for site spoil.
- 5. The items in the change register have been evaluated and endorsed by the project team with support from a Cost Planner (Turner Townsend), Building Engineering Review Consultant (AECOM), Infrastructure Delivery Partner (IDP) and Education Directorate stakeholders. These changes represent value for money for the Territory and improve the overall functionality of the school.

Funding Implication

6. The changes have increased the total project value by \$606,433 which is within the budget project appropriation. With the changes to both Phase 1 and Phase 2 the project appropriation still maintains a contingency total of \$1,500,141 excluding GST.

1. PURPOSE

To seek approval for the engagement of Lendlease Building Pty Ltd (Lendlease) to proceed to Phase 2 of the Campbell Primary School Modernization Project for a total Phase 2 amount of \$16,835,849.43 including GST.

2. PROJECT BACKGROUND

See attached endorsed Procurement Plan (Attachment A).

Phase 1 of the 2 Phase GC21 D&C contract was let on 10 September 2020. Refer to Attachments B1 – B2.— Contract Approvals and Attachment B3 – Phase 1 Letter of Award.

During Phase 1 (design development) a number of scope changes and additional requirements were identified. A breakdown of these changes has been provided in Attachment C1 – Scope Change Register.

The time period for completion of Phase 1 is forecast to conclude with completion of Early Works on Friday 5th February 2021 and Phase 2 will commence upon receipt of an approval of this recommendation and subsequent deed execution.

Funding

Funds have been identified in the 18/19 Budget under appropriation item "More Schools Better Schools, Campbell Primary School Modernisation". Additional funding has been provided January 2021 through appropriation number 81727 Better Schools for Our Kids – and Campbell Primary School.

The current forecast cost as described in this Recommendation is included in the Financial Summary (Green sheet) at Attachment D.

4. FINANCIAL – CONFIRMATION OF PHASE 1 AND PHASE 2 COSTS

Phase 1 Changes

The tendered value of the Campbell Primary School Modernisation for Phase 1 was \$499,080 ex GST. During Phase 1 a number of scope changes and additional requirements were identified in consultation with EDU-ICW and the School. This included transfer of "Early Works" from Phase 2 to Phase 1 (see **Attachment E** – ECWSC Variation Minute). These works consisted of erecting site fencing, constructing a temporary carpark and installing servicing for site sheds to enable a clearly defined site for students and the school community heading into Day 1 Term 1 2021. A total amount of \$302,035.80 was varied from Phase 2 to Phase 1 to facilitate these works.

Phase 1 also included variations to design scope and therefore additional design fees totaling \$33,605. These were approved through the PCG members.

Phase 1 has therefore been adjusted by total \$335,640.80.

Phase 2 Changes

The following is a summary of the changes made through Phase 2 and included in the Scope Change Register at **Attachment C1** and included in Lendlease's revised Phase 2 cost in their letter at **Attachment C2**. These amounts have been assessed by the cost planner as reasonable, per **Attachment F**, and margin has been added as per contract conditions.

Phase 2 is therefore proposed to be adjusted by total \$304,397.66.

The tendered value of initial Phase 2 works was originally \$15,000,920 ex GST and with the Design Change Register items listed, and the reduction of Early Works from Phase 2 as per further above, Phase 2 now totals **\$15,305,317.66** ex GST (\$16,835,849.43 incl GST). 5. EVALUATION

The Project Team is satisfied with the design development, program, Cost Plan and other contractors documents prepared by the contractor and are satisfied, following finalization of Early Works, that the contractor has not failed to achieve the contractors Phase 1 obligations. Finalization of the design detail will occur in the next Phase.
