

ACT SCHOOL CENSUS

February 2009

This publication provides information on students enrolled in ACT schools as at 18 February 2009.

Key Findings

In 2009, there were 64 380 students attending ACT public and non-government schools.

There were 38 280 students attending the 83 public schools, an increase of 50 students since 2008. This is the first increase in public school enrolments for over 10 years.

In 2009, there were 26 100 students attending the 44 non-government schools, including 514 preschool students.

There were 35 338 students (54.9% of all students) attending a primary school.

In 2009, there were 19 206 students (29.8% of all students) attending a high school.

A total of 9 508 students (14.8% of all students) attended secondary colleges.















Introduction

This publication presents the results from the ACT school census conducted on Wednesday 18 February 2009. The census covers public, Catholic and independent schools for preschool to year 12.

This is the first time that preschool enrolments in non-government schools have been included in the ACT school census, providing a more complete picture of school education in the ACT. Due to the inclusion of preschool enrolments at non-government schools, direct comparisons with previous years' data for primary level and all students should not be made.

This year, also for the first time, this publication presents information on the number of students of school age who undertook school equivalent courses through home education or the Canberra Institute of Technology.

Student enrolments 2005 to 2009

In 2009, there were 64 380 students enrolled in ACT public and non-government schools (Table 1).

In 2009, there were 38 280 students enrolled in public schools, up 50 students (0.1%) from 2008. This is the first time in over 10 years that there has been an increase in the number of students attending a public school.

In ACT public primary and college sectors, the number of students increased by 184 (0.8%) and 27 (0.5%) students respectively since 2008. Almost nine in 10 (88.1%) preschool level enrolments were in public schools in 2009. The increase in public college enrolments from 2008 to 2009 reverses the general declining trend over the past decade, including a decrease of 150 enrolments from 2007 to 2008. Increases in primary and college enrolments were partly offset by a decrease of 162 students (1.7%) in public high schools in 2009 since 2008.

The increase in public school students from 2008 to 2009 was also accompanied by an increase in non-government school enrolments (excluding preschool) of 203 students (0.8%). Independent schools recorded an increase in enrolments across the primary school, high school and college levels, while the Catholic sector recorded increases in both the primary and high school levels, but a decline in college enrolments in 2009 compared to 2008.

In 2009, public schools accounted for 38 280 students or 59.5% of the total student population.

Since 2008, the total number of Indigenous students in ACT schools has increased by 84 students, primarily due to an increase of 109 students (11.2%) at public schools (Table 2). Offsetting this increase in public sector Indigenous student enrolments were declines in both the independent and Catholic sectors, down five and 20 students respectively. The public sector continues to have the highest number of Indigenous students in 2009 (1 082 or 81.4%).

Since 2005, the number of students identifying as being of Indigenous origin has increased by 111 students (9.1%) to 1 330 students in 2009. While the number of Indigenous students has almost doubled since 2005 within the independent sector, this increase is from a relatively low base. The Catholic system has seen virtually no change in the number of Indigenous students since 2005, while the public school system has shown the greatest increase numerically, with an increase of 70 students (6.9%).

Since 2008, the number of special needs students has remained relatively constant, with an overall increase of 12 students (0.5%). The vast majority of special needs students are enrolled in public schools. In 2009, over eight in 10 (81.3%) special needs students were enrolled in a public school, up 25 students since 2008. The increase in public school special needs students was partly offset by a decline in non-government school special needs students, which declined by 13 students since 2008.

Since 2005 the number of students with special needs has increased by 231 students (11.8%) to 2 195 (Table 3). The public sector has experienced growth in special needs students each year since 2005 to 1 784 students in 2009, an increase of 117 students (7.0%), compared to 2005. The non-government sector has also seen an increase in special needs students, up 114 students (38.4%) since 2005.

Table 4 shows the split of male and female students across the various levels of schooling from 2005 to 2009. In total, there are slightly more males (51.0% in 2009) than females, although at the college level there was generally a lower proportion of males than in primary and high schools. In 2009, almost two-thirds (66.2%) of students at special schools were male. The 2009 results follow a similar trend from previous years.

Non-school education

It is recognised that there are alternative educational pathways for students to undertake school level courses other than by attending an ACT public or non-government school. For students residing in the ACT as at February 2009, 139 were home educated. In addition, a further 203 students, who were of school age, undertook school equivalent courses at the Canberra Institute of Technology.

Explanatory Notes

Reference date

The 2009 census was conducted on Wednesday 18 February.

Scope and coverage

The census includes all ACT public and non-government schools providing primary (including preschool level students in non-government schools for the first time in 2009), secondary and special education. Jervis Bay Primary School is included in ACT public primary schools as the ACT Department of Education and Training administers the Jervis Bay Primary School for the Australian Government under a service agreement.

Collection

ACT public school census data was electronically downloaded from the Department's centralised administrative system. Non-government school census data was electronically submitted to the Department.

Student enrolments

The census includes students who were officially enrolled in a school on census day and who were active in a primary (includes preschool level students in the non-government sector for the first time in 2009), secondary or special education program at that school. Students who were absent for more than four continuous school weeks prior to census date were included if the principal received written documentation signed by the guardian indicating that the student was to return to school on or before Monday of week 5, term 1.

Connect₁₀

The Connect10 program supports students to develop a personal pathway plan that may include one or more of the following goals: completion of Year 10 Certificate, transition to years 11 and 12, vocational learning, employment and/or re-engagement with high school. Students in the program are an appropriate age for year 9 or 10 and their participation must be approved by a referral panel. The length of placement is long term, designed to engage students in learning and training and transition to future pathways.

Connect10 programs are conducted at Lake Tuggeranong College (Connect10 Southern), Lake Ginninderra College (Connect10 Northern) and Dickson College (Connect10 Central).

Introductory English Centres (IECs)

Introductory English Centres (IECs) are for students who require intensive full time English language instruction.

There are three IECs in the primary sector, conducted at North Ainslie Primary School (Northside Primary IEC), Hughes Primary School (Southside Primary IEC) and Urambi Primary School (Tuggeranong Primary IEC). There is one IEC in the high school sector and the college sector, conducted at Dickson College (Secondary IEC).

Mature students

Students in public schools aged 20 years or over on 31 January in the year of commencement of their college studies are classified as Mature.

Explanatory Notes continued

Older students

Students in public schools aged 18 years by 31 December in the year prior to the commencement of their college studies, but not aged 20 years or over on 31 January in the year of commencement of their college studies, are classified as Older.

Primary school sector

In 2009, the primary school sector includes students from preschool to year 6 for both public and non-government schools. Prior to 2009, non-government primary included kindergarten to year 6 only. Preschool level data may include students who are aged three and attending a preschool program.

High school sector

High schools include those students in years 7, 8, 9 and 10.

College sector

The college sector includes those students in years 11 and 12 as well as those students defined as mature and older.

Special schools

Special schools cater for students with a moderate to profound intellectual disability, severe Autism Spectrum Disorder or with multiple disabilities who require intensive levels of support.

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
